

The Foundation Innovation Grant Program encourages and supports the efforts of district teachers and staff members who propose innovative projects to engage their students in more creative and exciting ways. We continued with the "rolling grants" for the 2022-23 school year with great success and awarded more grants to our staff than ever before.

During the 2022-23 school year, the Foundation celebrated a record-breaking year of fundraising and supporting public education. The Foundation gifted more than \$41,000 in classroom materials, technology, furniture and learning experiences to 114 Lindbergh teachers and staff through its Innovation Grant program.

THIS PAST SCHOOL YEAR, THE FOUNDATION JUNIOR BOARD:

SUMMER CAFE PROGRAM

There are more than 700 Lindbergh students who depend on free school lunches during the school year. Sometimes these lunches are the ONLY meal they get during the day. What happens over the summer? Lindbergh Lights the Way volunteers deliver meals to more than 100 Lindbergh students once per week throughout the entire summer.

The Lindbergh Schools Foundation hosted its largest ever Senior Scholarship Night on April 5.

The Lindbergh Schools Foundation currently manages the funds and/or administers the selection process for more than 85 scholarships that are awarded to LHS seniors each year. Additional scholarships are established by or in the name of former administrators, teachers, coaches and alumni.

In 2023, 62 students received a total of \$105,500 in scholarships to help further their education. Since our inception, we have helped provide a total of more than \$855,000 in scholarship funding to LHS students!

The original Lindbergh Schools Foundation General Scholarship is awarded each year to the student who, based on his or her application essay, has overcome the most significant challenges and hardships during high school. While we still award that scholarship

to several deserving students, we have many other types of scholarships as well.

Funds are raised through private donations, staff contributions and special funds.

Scholarship criteria ranges from a multitude of factors, not limited to, but including:

- Overcoming adversity
- Special financial needs
- Having a dedicated job
- Planning to join the military
- Planning to attend college
- Plans to attend a vocational school
- Athletics
- Community Service
