Our Achievements:

Supporting Families:

- 93 families fed through Summer Cafe
- 11 students and families received help with costs for school activities
- 18 students received supplies through the College & Career KickStart program
- 61 families received gifts through the Giving Tree program
- 17 families received help with their utility bills

Holiday Season: Your year-round support has been invaluable. During the Holiday Utility Campaign, we received over \$5,000 for our Utility Program. Additionally, over \$3,000 in cash donations and \$25,000 in clothes, toys, games, gifts, personal care items, and gift cards for groceries and gas were given to Lindbergh families through our Giving Tree Program.

Student Scholarships: We awarded \$500 scholarships to two graduating Lindbergh students who demonstrated a commitment to serving others and are pursuing education and training in philanthropic fields of study or work.

College & Career KickStart: Our College & Career KickStart Program was able to support 18 LHS seniors this year. This program is vital in providing essential school supplies, personal care items, and dorm supplies to graduating seniors who otherwise could not afford these items.

Summer Cafe: Over 800 Lindbergh students rely on free school lunches during the school year, and the recent surge in food prices has increased the financial burden on many families. In response, our Lindbergh Lights the Way - Summer Cafe program has doubled the number of families we serve. Volunteers deliver meals to more than 100 Lindbergh students once a week throughout the entire summer, ensuring that

these children receive the nourishment they need, sometimes their only meal of the day.

None of this would be possible without your incredible support. Your generosity has touched countless lives, providing essential assistance and hope to many in our community. Thank you for being a beacon of light for Lindbergh students and their families.

\$176,575 93 SCHOLARSHIPS

This year, we hosted our largestever Scholarship Night on April 3, 2024, where 66 students were awarded 93 scholarships totaling \$176,575 to further their education.

Since its inception, the Foundation has provided over **\$1 million** in scholarship funding to LHS students, thanks to your generous contributions.

The original Lindbergh Schools Foundation Scholarship continues to recognize students who have overcome significant challenges and adversity. While this scholarship remains an integral part of our program, we are proud to offer a wide variety of other scholarships as well.

The Foundation is excited to announce this year's recipient of the first ever Dr. Mary Louise Zieger Scholarship, Alexis Gralike. This scholarship, was made possible by Dr. Zieger's generous contribution of over \$1.7 million to the Lindbergh Schools Foundation.

Alexis was awarded a scholarship totaling \$56,000, providing \$14,000 per year for the next four years. This scholarship will ensure that Dr. Zieger's legacy will continue to impact the lives of deserving students like Alexis.

To be a recipient of this scholarship, a student must exhibit good character, intend to pursue a college education with a major in education, and have maintained at least a 3.5 cumulative GPA through their junior year of high school.



Each year during open enrollment, Lindbergh staff members are able to contribute a small amount from their paychecks to the Lindbergh Schools Foundation. 


